For more archival resources, contact The Rockefeller Archive Center (RAC), which serves as the primary repository of records pertaining to the business and family life of the Rockefellers. RAC also contains complimentary materials concerning The Riverside Church and its two predecessor congregations, the Fifth Avenue Baptist Church and the Park Avenue Baptist Church.

The First Presbyterian Church was the pulpit from which Dr. Harry Emerson Fosdick, The Riverside Church's first senior minister, delivered his famous 1922 sermon, "Shall the Fundamentalists Win." Fosdick served as the Associate and Preaching Minister of the Consolidated First Presbyterian Church from 1919 to 1924. Their collections focus largely on American and New York City architecture of the nineteenth and twentieth centuries. Avery holds a collection of architectural drawings by Allen & Collens, the architects of the Park Avenue Baptist Church, The Riverside Church, as well as The Cloisters and Union Theological Seminary.

The New York Public Library for the Performing Arts houses one of the world's most extensive combinations of circulating, reference, and rare archival collections in its field. The Library is known particularly for its prodigious collections of non-book materials such as historic recordings,



videotapes, autograph manuscripts, correspondence, sheet music, stage designs, press clippings, programs, posters, and photographs. The Library contains numerous video and sound recordings of performances at The Riverside Church as well as a small collection of recordings from the Church's former radio station, WRVR. The Library also holds the papers of Harold Vincent Milligan, the organist for Riverside's congregation from 1915 to 1940.

The AOIAL is dedicated to collecting, preserving, and making accessible primary and secondary source materials related to the American pipe organ, while also promoting interest in the history and culture of said instrument. They contain the papers of Virgil Fox, The Riverside Church organist from 1946 to 1965.

Faunce was the pastor of the Fifth Avenue Baptist Church, one of Riverside's predecessor churches, from 1889 to 1899, before becoming Brown's president from 1899 until his retirement in 1929.
